# CPS Students Connect with Scientists in Ambitious ScienceMakers Project

Through a partnership with The HistoryMakers, the Museum of Science and Industry, Black Creativity and the Chicago Public Schools, a youth *Interview a Scientist Day* will be offered on Black Creativity Family Day. Two hundred CPS students from Betty Shabazz International Charter School and Parker

Community Academy have been given the opportunity to interview five of the nation's leading African-American health scientists: Dr. Joanne Berger-Sweeney of Wellesley College, Dr. Edwin Cooper of UCLA, Dr. Erich D. Jarvis of Duke University, Dr. Roderic Pettigrew of the National Institute of Biomedical Engineering and Bioengineering, and Luther S. Williams of Tuskegee University. The scientists will be interviewed and videotaped by the students, who will have researched them beforehand using the specially created ScienceMakers DVD manual and toolkit. The three student winners of the ScienceMakers YouTube contest and their families will be feted and given prizes during an evening program hosted by Dr. Rick Kittles of the University of Chicago.
